HEALTH OFFICER'S REPORT: The Health Officer's report has been emailed to the Commissioner's. In addition, Michael shared he has spent time working on drafting the Ordinance that was presented earlier, as well as submitting Grant progress reports and expense reports. Beyond that there has been a general concern with the federal government freeze impacting programs like SNAP and WIC, as they go unfunded. This is something that may become a concern as it could impact residents who are in need of those resources. Regarding grants, at this time 2026 projections of reimbursable funds is \$70,000 from January 1, 2026 through June 30, 2026; there has been no indication of any other forthcoming grants from NJDOH or any other organization.

CFO REPORT: Statement of accounts was emailed to the commission.

TREASURER'S REPORT

The statement of accounts was emailed to all commissioners; all bills have been reviewed and signed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

BUDGET AND FINANCE – Chairperson Tom Rogers shared they have worked hard on Budget which will be introduced in the November meeting. Right now, we are looking at a 4% increase in the budget going into 2026. We are also going to implement a plan as to how the assessments are given out to each member municipality. JSRHC's Health Officer gave a summary, providing a visual through a screen share for the commissioners. He used data from 2024, including JSRHC's budget, to provide an overview as to how to assess member municipalities. This included dividing a given year's budget into three pay codes, where each pay code is then assigned a weighted factor as it relates to various data points of JSRHC's member municipalities.

There will be a 3-year phase in to implement this method of assessing member municipalities. Where year one would be composed of a third being set by the new assessment, and two thirds as assessed through older methods of assessing municipal costs. Year Two, two thirds will be set by the new assessment, one third as assessed through older methods of assessing

municipal costs. By year three, JSRHC member municipality assessments will be completely by the proposed new way.

A number of municipalities will decrease in the percentage of JSRHC budget they pay for annually. While others may pay a larger portion of JSRHC budget. Each municipalities rate would depend on their own needs and composition. This should make it much easier to make proposals for other municipalities to join JSRHC, as assessment are set in a way where all municipalities pay is tethered to their own communities.

HUMAN RESOURCES: - Chairperson Diane Anthony shared we have been working on the Union Contract and have submitted our thoughts to our attorney; we are trying to wrap this up as soon as possible. The big challenge will be the cost of the increase in health care. The commission has to stay with State Health Benefits and that is increasing significantly.

OPERATIONS: - No report at this time.

ORDINANCES – 2025-1 Removes JSRHC capacity to be an enforcement entity concerning noise issues as prescribed in Nuisance Code 1953. Enforcement of nuisance Noises issues would then default to each member municipality respectively. Each municipality would then be reliant on their own ordinances, as to what would be considered a nuisance noise issue and what entity they appoint to oversee and respond to residents’ concerns regarding noise.

Paul Roman moved this Ordinance, and it was seconded by President Giles of Spring Lake Heights

She didn't know if that would apply to any of our constituents. Tom Rogers said he would answer since he has experience with this as it happens every so many years. All the towns got the same information and Rumson is not participating. The other Administrators that were on the meeting also said they are not participating.

Paul Roman also spoke about the Public Health Association dinner and conference on the 16th of October where the Jersey Shore Regional Health Commission was recognized by PHAB for being one of only 8 Health departments in the state that is accredited. He also thanked Diane Anthony for attending this event.

There being no further business, President Giles adjourned the meeting at 3:25 PM
